We live in the "information age." We have instant access to more information than at any other time in history. But have you noticed that having information doesn't seem to be making much difference in how we live together as human beings in our communities or in this world? This past Sunday, we explored what it meant for human beings to live in freedom without loving responsibility to God and others. This Sunday, we turn our focus on what it means to use information and knowledge to build up others and make a positive impact on the world.

The church in Corinth had what we call "the Good News." They knew that God loved the world and everyone in it and had given us his Son who would

show us the ways of God, ultimately sacrificing himself out of that same love. This information - this news - transformed their lives and brought them together as a community. And their life together in that community was supposed to be shaped and pattered by that same love of God for us.

One word of warning from Paul to the Christians in Corinth is found in 1 Corinthians 8:1 as he warns that "knowledge makes people arrogant, but love builds people up." Having information that others do not have can tempt the information-holders into thinking that they are better, wiser and possibly even more valuable than others. Paul warns us that simply having information doesn't mean anything, especially information that is designed to be freely shared and demonstrated. The Church is called to not only share information, but to build others up in love. Join us on Sunday as we explore what this means!

The tropical band of the earth where the malaria parasite lives also contains countries that lack the economic resources to enact rigorous, effective antimalarial programs. In addition, much of the population in these countries is poor, malnourished, and illit-To add to the eradication erate. challenge, wholesale population movements caused by droughts and armed conflicts have taken malaria from infected to non-infected areas. Finally, both mosquitos and parasites have developed resistance to insecticides and drug treatments. Effective eradication programs will have to be multifaceted and global.
