Financial Update

At Thanksgiving this year, I was able to report to my family all of the wonderful things happening at Bluff Park UMC! My father, who attends two separate Methodist churches in the Carolinas, remarked how impressed he is with the level of activity and the depth of



ministry at our church. We certainly have a lot to be thankful for on the Bluff!

At the same time, we also have challenges. We have been talking about worship attendance in our Traditional Worship services. We have seen a drop in giving as Rick Hardy will explain in more detail on the front page of the newsletter. I have personally spoken to some of our members who simply cannot attend as much as they would like. They have transitioned into a fixed income situation and may not be able to meet their pledge amounts. I have reminded each of these persons that this is always their church and we understand when changes occur. I trust that some of our church members will be able to stand in the breach and give a bit more this year to help our church meet its ministry and mission goals. We have received over 200 pledges for the 2019 budget and those pledges remain strong. We still need many more to make our budget for the new year. As you can imagine, this is a time where deep commitment and compelling vision are needed. We are ready to take our next steps but we can only do so together as one church!


An Early Christmas

August in Alabama hardly puts you in the spirit of the Christmas season. But, in the middle of kids returning to school and end of summer trips to the lake, we started collecting Christmas Shoeboxes to send to our missionaries working in Central and South America.

The reason we must start so early is that those boxes have a long journey ahead of them before arriving in the hands of a child at Christmas. After we collect them at the church, they are brought to the UMCOR Warehouse in Decatur, AL to join the donations from many other United Methodist churches. The individual boxes must be checked before being crated up to ship to their final destination in time for Christmas.

So much of what we do to share the love of Jesus with others requires advanced planning and preparation. We collected socks and blankets in October so that our partners ministering to the homeless in our area have supplies on hand when the weather turns cold. Our food pantry team has been making arrangements to distribute special holiday boxes during the month of December, and our Festival of Three Kings sponsors gather gifts for children during the month of November to distribute in early December.

Thank you to all of the church members who plan ahead and ensure that the mission work of Bluff Park UMC is ready to meet the needs that God places before us.











CELEBRATING GIFTS AND YEAR-END GIVING

Churches typically receive as much as 25% of their gifts in the last two months of the year. As you make your plans to complete your 2018 financial commitment, here are three additional possibilities for resources beyond cash gifts. Please note that these possibilities are listed for educational purposes. Please consult your personal advisor for your specific information.

GIFTS OF APPRECIATED STOCKS OR BONDS

You can transfer ownership of stocks, bonds or mutual funds to the church and receive a charitable tax deduction based on the full fair market value of the securities on the date of the transfer. This avoids the capital gains tax while giving the church the benefit of the full value of the security. To receive this benefit, it is important to transfer ownership before the security is sold. For your gift to apply to the current tax year, the securities must be in the account of the local church (or our Foundation) by December 31st. So, allow plenty of lead time for your broker to complete this transaction.

GIFTS OF REAL ESTATE

A charitable gift of real estate can be especially tax advantageous. If a home, vacation home, acreage or farm property has appreciated in value over the years – its sale could result in a sizable capital gains tax. If the real estate is given to the church prior to the sale, you can avoid the tax and realize a charitable deduction for the full fair market value of the real estate. One could even consider a bargain sale transaction with half of the funds to the church and the other half to the donor.

GIFTS OF LIFE INSURANCE

When you name the church as the owner and beneficiary of a life insurance policy, it usually offers you a tax advantage in the year you make the gift. You can take a charitable deduction approximately equal to the cash value at the time of the gift. Additionally, continued payments of premiums may qualify as charitable tax deductions each year.

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

Thanksgiving has passed and Christmas is fast approaching, it seems a great time to reflect on and celebrate the ways God has blessed the Children's Ministry at Bluff Park UMC in 2018. In the past year:

We offered 4 mission trip/field trips to teach children the importance of sharing the love of Christ with their friends, their family, their community, and the world. The 26 children who attended each field trip shopped for and packed/delivered school supplies, Christmas gifts, blankets, food, etc. for people in our community and around the world who were in need of these things.

We offered our second year of Camp on the Bluff, a free skills-based summer camp geared towards children in our community who may not be able to afford to attend summer camp, as well as the children of our church. 60 children attended our first year (2017), and that number grew to 100 children this year. Vacation Bible School also grew from 205 children in 2017 to 263 children in 2018.



The children of our church and community raised \$1375 dollars at VBS to benefit Room 35226, and \$317 at our Halloween Carnival to benefit NeverThirst.

We began providing age appropriate Bibles to all the children of our church at three key points in their spiritual journey: once when they are baptized, once when they enter Kindergarten, and once when they enter the 3rd grade.

We have continued to teach our children how much God loves them, how they can form a relationship with God through Jesus Christ, how they can grow in that relationship, and how they can share the love of God with others!

God has truly blessed the Children's Ministry in 2018, and we could not have accomplished everything above without the help of such a loving and caring congregation. Whether you prayed for us, volunteered with us, contributed you tithes and offerings, or loved on the children of our church in any way, we could not have done it without you! Thank you for investing in the lives of the children of our church and our community, and thank you for helping us have such a great year! Merry Christmas!
