Message from the Pastor

When the people of were scattered from Palestine around the Mediterranean and the Middle East, it was called "diaspora." It was the unfortunate state of God's people who were supposed to be gathered together as one people in the land of God's promise. The scattering had at least one negative and at least one positive outcome. The negative outcome was that the faith of the scattered



people became more difficult to hold as it was. They were strangers in a strange land and felt the pressure to assimilate. The positive outcome was that their unique faith was able to witness to new peoples.

In a way, we have experienced two weeks of diaspora. And as I write this at the end of March, it is possible that even on Easter Sunday we will be sheltering in our homes as we proclaim that Christ, our Lord, is risen! This is a very unusual moment for such a churched-culture like we have in the south. Eventually, we will gather again. But the negative outcome may be lurking around the corner. We will likely be tempted to stay at home more frequently now that we have experienced online worship. We may even be tempted to care for ourselves rather than to get out of our comfort zones and serve others in the name of Christ.

But we shall overcome those temptations. We shall because God will not let us! And we shall because we are the kind of church that believes in gathering together. The positive of this temporary diaspora is that we are really discovering just how much we need one another and what gathering together truly does for our souls. Another positive of this temporary diaspora is that we are beginning to see the real meaning of the church. The church is more than just a gathering of good Christian friends. We gather so that we can be formed. And we gather so, that we can be sent by God to witness and to serve. I know many people have experienced new ways of serving their neighbor and witnessing their faith in this strange time. It just goes to show what God can do in every situation we face. All things are possible with the God who called the people of Bluff Park United Methodist Church together as one body. Thanks be to God!

Help During the Coronavirus... Church Members Step Up to Help!

From the outside it may appear that the life of the church has come to a standstill, but nothing could be further from the truth. A tremendous amount of mission and ministry continues to happen through the work of our staff and volunteers.

Our food ministry has become more vital than ever as the most vulnerable members of our community struggle to keep food on the table. With Birmingham issuing a shelter-in-place order, our Food Pantry team made some rapid shifts in their plans. Many of the clients of our Pantry live in Birmingham, so we are partnering with Urban Ministries to bring the food closer to the people.

Pantry volunteers are also delivering groceries to seniors living at the AHEPA 3 and AHEPA Penelope apartments. Additional food deliveries are being made to individuals in need. If you know of someone who needs groceries or paper goods, please contact the church at 822-0910.

The Under the Bridge team continues to feed the homeless during this crisis. They are working with the Mayor's Office of Citizens Assistance to provide meals for about 50 people on Tuesdays while adapting to protect the health of the volunteers and those they serve.

Food ministry is a huge concern, but so is care and contact. Sunday school class leaders are checking in on their members. Our ministers and volunteers are making calls to older members of our congregation to let them know we care about them and ask if they need any assistance during the pandemic. The Open Door Café volunteers are doing the same for their members.

Finally, church staff and volunteers have been sitting down in front of cameras and reading stories to our children to bright their day and keep them connected.

There is a lot of mission and ministry happening here at Bluff Park!

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

We in the Children's Ministry at Bluff Park United Methodist Church hope and pray that everyone is staying safe during this unprecedented time. Based on the recommendations of church, local, state, and national officials, we have made the difficult decision to cancel the community wide Easter Egg Hunt that was scheduled for Saturday, April 4th. In addition, we have canceled children's programming on Sunday mornings and Wednesday nights until the children return to school.

However, even though we are unable to meet in person, we are doing everything in our power to provide ways for families to stay connected and continue being the church during this time. Along those lines, we are providing a BPUMC Story Time each day, where a staff member or teenager reads stories to the children of our church and community. Further, we are creating Children's Church videos each week for the children to use on Sunday mornings (or anytime throughout the week), as well as providing a family devotional each Tuesday that we hope families will work through together. Lastly, both the Student Ministry and Children's Ministry are jointly offering a weekly family activity/challenge (with prizes!) that families can work on together. 

No matter what happens in the coming weeks, you can stay connected and worship with your church family here at Bluff Park.


Step 1: Visit www.bluffparkumc.org

Dear friends,

I am inspired by how North Alabama United Methodists are responding to the coronavirus pandemic. Churches of all sizes are finding innovative ways to be Christ's hands and feet in their communities.

Examples include:

- Online worship services offered by many of our congregations, with more being added every day. A few churches are hosting drive-in worship, using low-cost FM transmitters to allow participants to worship in their cars;
- One church continues to cook Celebrate Recovery meals, using a drive-through system for safe social distancing and distribution of the meals. In the drivethrough, leaders offer support, prayer and counseling for participants' hurts, habits and hang-ups;
- Facebook Live Lunchtime Gatherings proposed each day with devotions, conversation and games;
- Phone calls, emails, notes and texts made to persons who are at risk of feeling isolated;
- Curbside pick-up and front porch delivery of fresh-cooked meals. One church calls this the "Feast of Sharing" ministry;
- Live bedtime stories read by children's ministry leaders for children watching online;
- Youth groups check in virtually and teachers offer online tutoring;
- Small churches open their front doors with sanitizer handy for those who want to pray individually observing Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommendations;
- Volunteers connecting with community groups to provide services to homeless and under-resourced persons;

Thank you for continuing to be the church in the face of this pandemic. Even though the Cabinet and I are requesting the continued suspension of all in-person worship services and gatherings until local public health officials and the CDC change their restrictions, we North Alabama United Methodists are actively providing important ministry and services in the lives of our congregants and community.

Many of you have already begun discerning creative alternative ways to celebrate Holy Week and Easter. A summary of such ideas will be circulated by District Superintendents to clergy next week as well as a reflection paper on the theology and how-tos of serving Holy Communion during this time.

The Conference Leadership Team and I are carefully monitoring the coronavirus pandemic and will be in touch with you on a regular basis as the situation evolves. In the meantime, I am so proud of the extraordinary witnesses you are for Christ.

As always it is a privilege to serve as your bishop.
